CURRENT RESEARCH

Ph.D. Dissertation—“Is Urban Combat a Great Equalizer?”. My dissertation is a structured, focused comparison of six cases of urban combat between technologically dissimilar forces to investigate whether urban combat is a “great equalizer” that neutralizes a superior force’s capabilities in firepower, surveillance, and communications. This research will add to the understanding of urban combat and thus inform the development and employment of regular forces that must fight in cities by analyzing to what extent and how does urban combat equalize military capability.
